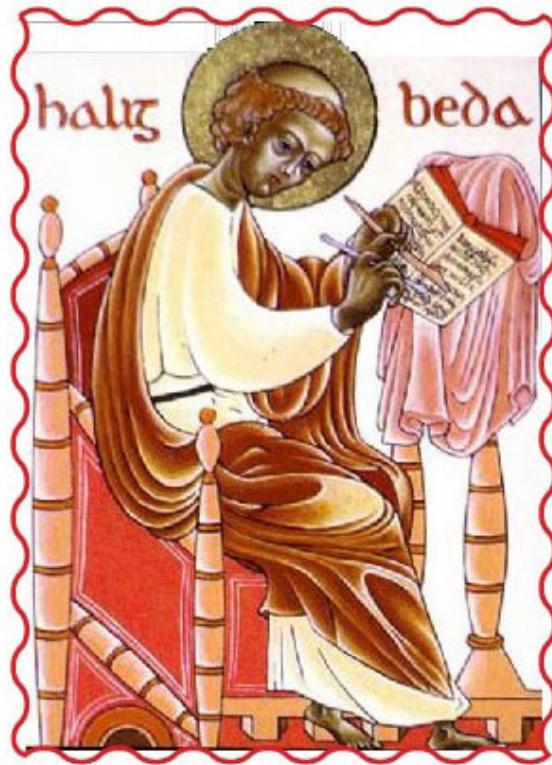



## A Successful Organ Restoration Campaign — We Did It!

We are delighted to be able to let you know that the St. Bede's Organ Appeal has been completely successful. Sixty-three generous donors have raised the \$45,000 needed to cover the thorough cleaning and refurbishment necessary, and the work is in progress. We were also very fortunate to find nearby accommodation for Hans-Ulrich Erbslöh, *Orgelbaumeister*, and his assistant, Bernd Becker – thank you Ed and Carol Brink; and thank you, David Chu and Irene Lawrence, for lending them a car!

We do invite you to visit St Bede's during the week as Hans and Bernd work. It's quite extraordinary to watch as they dismantle the instrument pipe by pipe. We are learning some shocking things too: at some point during the last forty years, our tuners must have decided that one of the ranks was simply too difficult to tune, so they solved the problem by stuffing those pipes with cotton to prevent them sounding!



## “Ei” Spied and Commented

### Martin Buber as a Golden Thread

Martin Buber is one of those figures who has been a golden thread in my theological reflections. He died in the mid ‘60s and at the time of his death the New York Times called him “...the foremost Jewish religious thinker of our time and one of the world’s most influential philosophers.” His most influential book was written in 1923. It was entitled *I–Thou*. The book has been in continuous print since initial publication and has been translated into most modern languages.

I remember hearing a psychotherapist talk about how the book had influenced him in a talk prepared for hospital chaplains in San Diego. Martin Buber’s thought creates a meeting place for theology and psychotherapy. Buber focuses our attention on the “between” of I–Thou, the value of two souls connecting in the quality of meeting.



In a sense, the “hyphen” is the contact... a merging of I and Thou in which both become more who they were, not less.

In Buber’s work we encounter the Other in nature and beauty, in another person and in the moments of Prayer... all are possible places for an I–Thou encounter.

When I was growing up there was a time in my middle school years when I used my time with Bach as a point of healing and sacred encounter. The music was a portal into a world of healing beauty beyond myself... an “I–Thou” relationship. In the I–Thou encounter we are drawn into the abundant life of the resurrected Jesus. It is a more sacred experience because we are self-aware but not self-absorbed as we appreciate a broader dimension of the creation in which we are only a part.

Most of the time we are not in an I–Thou relationship with creation and great natural beauty. We are usually in an I–It relationship. If you have ever been standing before a place of great natural beauty and had a teenager say, in a bored tone, “Soooooo...” you know the definition of closed off. Someone who has stood in an art gallery next to tired kids or adults has also had this experience. “Big deal” is not what you hope to hear as you stand in front of great art. The art, the symphony, or the natural beauty of a place is a constant but our own willingness to be

available to it is something that can change. When we open up, it transforms the I–It moment into the I–Thou flash of insight and connection. Such moments are not very common.

I suspect researchers have such moments after long, long periods of combing through a jumble of data and then catching a glimpse of a potential structure they had never noticed before.

When we encounter people all too often we see them as what they do or in their role. “This is my husband,” “this is my sister,” “this is my dentist.” The I–Thou relationship is only possible when we move beyond what we use someone for and encounter them as a full, multi-dimensional person. In the I–Thou relationship we do not hide behind our function but risk being known. Sometimes of course it is appropriate that we remain in our work role and function as a professional. However deeper connections with others also matter... Does anyone you care about really know you more fully? We need to be known for who we are and not what we do by some of those in our life.

Is it possible to relate to God in an I–It way? YES! How do we relate to God as an It? We settle on an image of God that worked when we were in the 6<sup>th</sup> grade and never moved much beyond it. You can practice your religion as a form, but in doing so, fail

to enter an intimate, I–Thou engagement with God.

Some people can tell you ABOUT God but they are unaware of God as I AM—the living, vibrant, I–Thou reality we experience as a beyond-definable Being. The ONE who seeks us and finds us if we are open to the invitation.

This God is loving and desires our good. But we must be willing to risk the experience of being real and in contact with Presence to pray like this. Usually we find it is our pride that must be surrendered to allow this. We find in an I–Thou encounter with God that we are in God’s debt and for many such knowledge is intolerable. It is easier for some to believe they can earn salvation.

While it is not possible to earn such favor, it doesn’t stop us from wanting to. It is the ever-popular British heresy, Pelagianism, alive and well. Martin Buber, however, saw very hopefully that “The barbed wire fences of the heart” are not something that keeps us from abundant life forever. Amen to that. May it be so. In a biography of Buber, Audrey Holes said, “Buber defined the true prophet as ‘a quivering magnet needle pointing the way to God.’” ...and so you did Rabbi Buber. Shalom. We are grateful for you.

Since our first meeting in May, Rev. Eileen has been very supportive of my desire to increase our efforts in newcomer/hospitality ministry and all-ages community service, to which I feel particularly drawn, but couldn't do much about while leading all youth programs. At her invitation, I'm continuing to attend staff meetings in the transition, not only to provide the continuity that Rev. Kitty sought, but also to help focus my new volunteer roles.

Another new role for me is representing St. Bede's on the Trinity School Board of Trustees, starting this month. With the support of Rev. Eileen and chapel director Rev. Jane McDougale, I'm staying on as a weekly school chaplain. Special thanks go to Ed Brink, for volunteering musical accompaniment in chapel for the second year in a row—and to all the kids, youth, mentors and parents who've journeyed with me this far. I cherish our relationships and look forward to seeing you at St. Bede's this fall.

Congratulations and best wishes to **John Wenstrand**, recently engaged to wed Meagan Kenny.



## Breaking Bread at Bede's, 10/3: Author Marty Brounstein


Save the date of Wednesday, 3 October, for Breaking Bread at Bede's, an inspiring speech and discussion led by Marty Brounstein, author of *Two Among the Righteous Few: A Story of Courage in the Holocaust*, with an optional supper, in the parish hall.

Described as a "true story of interfaith courage and compassion," Brounstein's 2011 book focuses on a young Christian couple in Netherlands who, despite enormous risk, help save the lives over two dozen Jews during the Holocaust. The head of a Bay Area management and organizational consulting firm for more than twenty years and an engaging speaker, Brounstein had written numerous business texts before discovering

a close personal connection to this story of tolerance and bravery. His lively presentation includes setting the historical context for the unlikely heroes, making it appropriate for middle and high school youth as well.

St. Bede's is inviting the public and especially members of local synagogues to join us at this event, with kosher meal options. Please consider inviting a friend from outside the parish as well, or offering a ride to parishioners who are unable to drive at night. We'll offer drinks and nibbles at 5:30pm, supper (RSVP and donation requested) at 6:00 and the talk at 6:30, wrapping up by 7:30pm (in time for choir practice). The talk is free, with copies of Brounstein's book available for purchase.

Let the heavens and the earth praise him,


the seas and all that moves in them;

they shall live there and have it in possession.


The children of his servants will inherit it,

## Planned Giving

### Making Your Gift Last Forever



The anxious caller asked “What do you think I should do? I hear that they are borrowing from the parish endowment fund. Isn’t that illegal?”

“Well, it might not be illegal, although it may be unwise,” I responded. I explained that bequests that were designated for the endowment by the vestry, rather than by the donor, could legally be used for other purposes—if the vestry were to later decide to this.

“But these are meant to be *permanent* funds, with only the income being spent,” the caller protested. She indicated that she was planning to reduce her own planned gift from \$100,000 down to \$1,000! With her bequest, she said, would be a note informing the vestry that she had slashed the value of her gift because they had shown that they could not be trusted not to violate the endowment funds.

“If you want to make your gift last forever,” I counseled, “You could state clearly in your will or trust that only the *income* is to be spent.”

“Another option,” I told her, “would be to establish your endowment fund at the Diocese, for the sole benefit of your parish. Then

the annual income would be distributed each year to your parish but they would not have access to the principal.”

When this call ended, the donor had still not made up her mind about which course she would follow. Vestries must be aware that their long-term gift planning donors are looking over their shoulders. Donors are concerned that their gifts will be well-managed and well-spent—and fully respected if designated for permanent endowment. The lesson for donors is to consult in advance with your Gift Planning Officer on ways to make your wishes come true—especially if you want your gift to last forever.


