A Letter from Rev. Martha

Dear People of St. Bede's,

While he was praying in his town's church one day, Francis of Assisi famously heard the voice of Jesus say, "Francis, Francis, go and repair My house which, as you can see, is falling into ruins." Believing this to be a call to make repairs to the physical structure of the church he was standing in, he set out to make repairs to that building. Only later did he realize that Christ was calling him to heal the wounds of the church, that is, the Body of Christ. He set out to care for all those in need and taught that we should love everyone and everything, even though they differ from us. Saint Francis set such a remarkable example for both the Christians of his time, as well as every Christian since, that he continues to be one of the most loved and venerated of all the saints.

The Feast of Saint Francis is Sunday, October 4. Saint Bede's will honor the Feast of Saint Francis in three ways this year. I invite you to not only participate in them, but also to invite your loved ones to join us. (That is the great gift of having worship online, we can invite people near and far!) Here is how St. Bede's will honor Saint Francis this year:

SoulWork at 8:30 a.m. Because of his great love and compassion, people flocked to Saint Francis, and followed him and his teachings. Thereby, Saint Francis helped to grow the church, and people's relationship with the church. It seems fitting then, that we have a **parish-wide conversation about church growth at St. Bede's** on this day. This conversation will be led by Sue Sartor and Martha Korienek, and will create room for everyone to share their thoughts. Please note that we will offer this conversation a second time for those who are unable to join us on October 4: **this same conversation will be offered on Thursday, October 8. at 7 p.m.** You'll find the Zoom link in the weekly *eNews*.

Morning Prayer at 9:30 a.m. Saint Francis, like Jesus, cared for the children in his community. To honor his day, we will have a **family-friendly service with Bible readings from a children's Bible and a children's sermon** from our Minister for Children & Youth, Brendan Deocariza-Nee.

Pet Blessing at the End of Morning Prayer. Saint Francis famously preached to the birds and considered all of creation to be holy. This is why churches around the world have pet blessings on his feast day. We will **conclude our Morning Prayer service with a Pet Blessing**, so have your furry friends handy at the conclusion of our worship this day!

I look forward to honoring Saint Francis with you, by having a conversation about the church, worshiping God and blessing our pets on October 4. And may the compassion, joy, and love of God that Saint Francis inspires in us this day remain with us always.

Vestry View

This periodic report on the Vestry's actions and decisions is part of our commitment to serving the St. Bede's community. Following is a brief recap of key issues discussed and actions taken at September's Vestry meeting.

Vestry priorities. Anne Vitullo and Martha Korienek noted the priorities for the balance of 2020:

- Review and approval of the 2021 budget,
- A successful stewardship campaign,
- Interviews with the final candidates for Rector,
- Phase 1 reopening, and
- Transition plans for the new Rector.

Rector Selection Process. Denise Obando from the Diocesan Office of Transition Ministry met with Vestry to outline the selection process when final candidates are presented by the Search Committee to Vestry. Vestry members are responsible for interviewing the final candidates, selecting a candidate to call as our next Rector, and recommending our choice to Bishop Marc Andrus for his approval.

Review of August financial statements. Treasurer Julie Backlund gave an overview of our financial statements for the month of August.

Preliminary budget scenarios. Julie presented Vestry with a preliminary look at two budget scenarios for 2021, one in which we meet our fundraising goal for 2021, and one in which we fall short. Should fundraising fall short, Vestry will have to consider how much money we can reasonably take from our reserves while still maintaining a healthy six-month reserve to cover unforeseen emergencies, and how to cut programming to reduce our expenses. Vestry will review a more detailed budget at its October meeting and expect to have a "first look" at the results of our 2021 Stewardship campaign at that meeting.

Fall Stewardship campaign. Van Jepson shared the detailed timeline for this year's Stewardship campaign which kicks off on Sunday, October 4. The theme for this year's campaign is **Faithful Community ... Faith-filled Generosity.** The Stewardship team has set a "stretch" financial goal of \$287,000 and 100% participation for this year's campaign. An expanded team of both Vestry members and Stewardship committee members (Carol Brink, Laura Gable, Helen Greenwood, Van Jepson, Irene Lawrence, Nancy Stork, Anne Vitullo and Dick Zeren) will be contacting parishioners personally about pledging this year. Individual parishioners who are not part of the Stewardship team will present "why I give" testimonials at each of our Zoom Chapel services through November 1.

Listening sessions on growing the parish. Martha and Sue Sartor have prepared plans for two discussions on growing the parish, to be held on October 4 and October 8.

Trinity School Update

San Mateo County has approved Trinity School's waiver application for on-site learning for the upper school and there is great joy that upper-school classes (K through 5) could open on September 30. St. Bede's is the site of Trinity School's upper campus, while our sister parish, Trinity Church Menlo Park, hosts the lower campus pre-school where on-site classes have been in session – and thriving! – since late August. Parents of all students can elect distance learning if they would prefer it. Trinity School is partnering with The Village Doctor, a concierge medical service in Woodside, as we navigate through the reopening process on both campuses and throughout the year. Fun and community building are ongoing with the virtual Back-to-School barbeque and virtual Back-to-School sessions in September.

Led by Board President Michelle Swenson, a St. Bede's parishioner, the School Board recently approved a launch of their strategic planning process. Because of COVID-19, we are refocusing our process to plan for three years rather than our original five years. Among the topics to be addressed are: enrollment and marketing; campus facilities; governance; and value proposition (What we do well and how we communicate it effectively).

Thomas maintains an active performance career and sings regularly with the San Francisco Lyric Chorus and San Francisco Renaissance Voices, in addition to teaching voice lessons throughout the Bay Area.

Thomas holds a B.M. in vocal performance from the San Francisco Conservatory of Music. He has studied as Choral Fellow for the Young Women's Choral Projects of San Francisco, under the tutelage of Susan McMane, and pursued continuing study of the Kodály methodology at Holy Names University.
